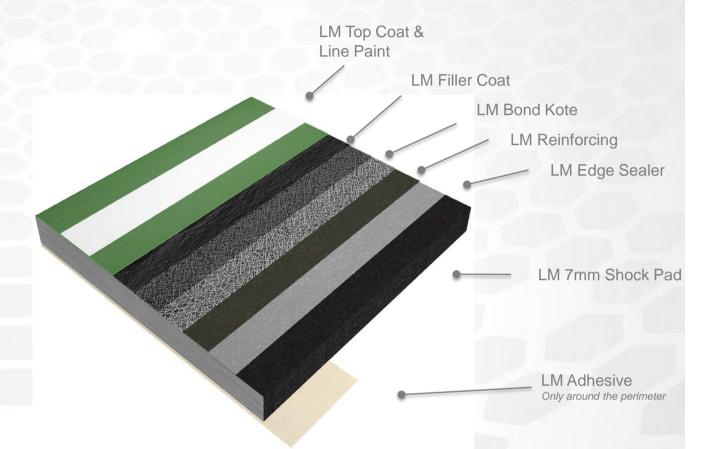

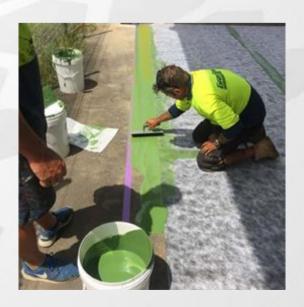

To the ASTC.

The West Cricket Club (WCC) is one of the oldest established sporting clubs in Alice Springs, having celebrated 50 years in our community. WCC are in the process of replacing our antiquated training facility with a new safe and up to date facility. The intention being that this will, with minimal upkeep, allow for quality training for the next 50 years. As an established part of the Alice Springs sporting community WCC currently cater for three senior , a women's and three full junior teams, also running the blaster program for 5 to9 year olds. The future objective directions of our club is to increase our engagement particularly in the areas of women's, Junior and indigenous cricket. This will be assessed by growth in cooperation with the Clontarf program, the development and growth of an indoor junior competition, furthering in and off season junior training. Added to this is the investment in Indigenous, Pakistan and Indian cricketers participation.

Our aim is to construct an up to date safe training facility for future generations as well as for the current one. Already our membership includes senior, junior and women's cricketers from many varied ethnic groups. The current facility is a mishmash of added sections over the years having never had an overall plan. The new facility would be fully lockable to deter vandalism and deification. It would be extended to 4 lanes, allowing for more dedicated usage during already tight training sessions. The exterior would be made of mesh the inside would be netted with 3 sliding middle lane nets, catering for extensive adaptability of the facility. A full net would cover the ceiling. The proposed plan is to build it alongside the existing facility in a currently vacant section of land. The purpose is to also provide healthy living opportunities with a suitable training facility. This will be of advantage not only to our local Sporting community but for the many national sportspeople who travel to Alice Springs for such events as the National Indigenous Cricket Competition, Imparja Cup and Masters games. Added to this is the year round local usage that extends into the off season with training for the Winter cup and Alice Springs Players League as well as a local training facility for the local school community including the Clontarf program.

The use of a net facility is an established, well recognised and major part of the Cricket community for their training. Our current facility is not catering for the demand put on it with so many groups requiring the facility and particularly in the limited afternoon usage time. Also in our current time is not particularly safe, with balls able to spring out at speed in many directions. The facility is centrally located and although currently inadequate is utilised by varied and culturally diverse groups within the community and from interstate players particularly during our Imparja cup and NICC and Masters games carnivals. These groups include but not excluded to Indigenous, Pakistani, Indian, Bangladesh, British and Americans experiencing local culture.

The proposed facility allows for safe, and healthy alternative catering for introduction level through to high performance intense training. Having (four) multiple lanes will contributes greatly to this, by allowing varied activities and groups to participate at the same time. Whilst adding the incredible benefit of an adaptable flexible facility; it also allows for a safe and contained solitary training facility when used in conjunction with a bowling machine. This area can then easily be transformed into an indoor arena, for safe contained games particularly for the development and growth of junior cricket. Currently the existing nets are not adequate for all the different groups to share the facility to maximum benefits and the general time restraints with school and work etc. This facility will cater for more people to be actively involved and training at one time. Resulting in the provision of more opportunity which equals more cricket contact and better overall development of the player and the game. Living so isolated this becomes even more

















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crucial. It will also allow for the development of an off season indoor competition to assist juniors to engage in a healthy organised sport.

Our club and the outdated facility engages many different and varied peoples. The existing nets are the most used and convenient public accessible nets in Alice Springs and as such are used extensively by not only two clubs but the wider community in general who just want to come down for a hit. With the new upgrade of fencing around the Jim McConville oval this will in effect remove 3 to 5 meters from the existing run ups, making the facility impractical for our fast bowlers. The new facilities will become an asset for the ASTC it will be maintained by the WCC.

From a sporting perspective they are currently utilised during the cricket season to provide men's and women's and junior cricket training. During the off season at least 3 of the winter league teams base their training there.

WCC is leading the way in meaningful grass roots development its initiatives and commitment to both women's and junior development of boys and girls and particularly the inclusion of indigenous young people. WCC is currently supporting three strong junior teams and a women's team. This commitment currently is hampered by an outdated wire cage that has a heavy impact on the balls causing excessive wear and expense to the club. Trying to alleviate this conveyer belt has been placed on the sides but this then I turn turns white balls black and does little to absorb recoil. Added to this the nature of the sides means balls are likely to return with speed upon an unsuspecting batsman causing fear and timidness which in the case of developing sportspeople is disastrous for their development. An updated facility that not only the clubs involved but also that the community can be proud of and we believe will ultimately help draw people toward our iconic sport.

This project is very important to the future and sustainability of the club. It will provide a safe training facility free from the present hazards. Currently we are using the most dilapidated set of nets in the town, they are a combination of different slaps and patches of varying carpet. It is barely adequate yet has the highest demand of all local facilities. The proposed facility will bring a lot of pride to the players knowing that the best practically possible training facilities are accessible for them. In regard to the local cricket community the project will achieve more players coming into the sport, eventually we aim to add lighting, something that is not practical with the current facility. This then will result in an ability to move training out of the scorching desert sun. This will also mean those working can train at more suitable hours and this will enable many who currently struggle due to work commitments to participate in training. This then producing better players resulting in more success and more interest in the community, providing both sponsorship and players. By removing the high demand of club training the existing facility will be more sustainable for general community use.

We believe that this project will increase participation by providing a safe and up to date facility people will be more willing to train and play. By providing more contained and flexible environment for training. By adapting the middle nets we can increase the lane size to allow for freer hitting without chasing balls but still enjoying the freedom of experiencing a full hit without danger of the ball bouncing back at the player. Also it enables juniors to practice till latter in a lane when the temperature is more reasonable. Currently we have to out of the existing facility by 5:30 to allow for adult training. With other club utilising other evening our junior net sessions are restricted to the heat of the afternoon. This will allow for juniors to train latter in more reasonable temperatures. Added to this is that more specialised one on one training will be able to be performed by our coaches.

Last season a local Indigenous female football team Alkamilya fielded a cricket team in the local women's competition. They have also been utilising the Jim McConville

















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facilities for training. They remain an independently run indigenous team and are now supporting women's cricket. WCC fully embrace this initiative and where instrumental in its development, and hope to encourage more participation by providing a safer and user friendly facility. Added to this, it will assist in convincing more parents that our facility is safe and we are endeavouring to provide the best and safest facility and training environment for juniors. Public perception in this area is so important when trying to engage juniors into our sport. Due to our extremes of weather cricket on a hot summer day is often perceived unfairly so having up to date modern facilities will greatly benefit the whole cricket community. Ultimately to gain more involvement within the local community. This will also allow us as a club to invite our local schools in the preseason to come and utilise the facility to play indoor cricket and build our standing and develop our future playing base. WCC is running its own Woolworths blast sessions this season our stage 2 and 3 coaches where the only people who regularly stood up. To ensure this program was successful. It was also held at the Jim McConville oval. Given the new facility this will also be a a safe contained area to play games with our junior blasters. Also during the last holidays WCC in cooperation with Hurricanes BBL side held a clinic to develop young players in Alice Springs. This was done in 2 groups, U12s and over 12s, this proved very successful. Given the new facility more events like this would be possible for us to run, particularly with access to all our training equipment and new change room facilities onsite.

WCC is one of the most progressive and active clubs in our community particularly around juniors. Given the new facility we believe that we will have more opportunity to promote and increase participation in our iconic sport.

Currently we have a CBF major grant (major contributor to overall funding). We have also applied for a Cricket Australia Infrastructure Fund, This is still being finalised due to Covid interruption, however procuring this grant added extra costs in ensuing the new facility was up to national standards. We are currently about \$8,8844.60 shortfall of our necessary funds. This is without West Cricket Club, covering cost of the plans and all sundries and unforeseen expenses and any Alice Springs Town Council (regulations and planning) cost associated.
