The Quarterly Community Report provides Council's progress delivering the 25/26 Municipal Plan, as well as key achievements, and updates on capital works programs and Council's plans.





Introduction

The Quarterly Community Report provides an open and accessible update on how Alice Springs Town Council is progressing against the goals and priorities set by Elected Members on behalf of the community. It's a snapshot of the work happening right across Council – the achievements, challenges, and ongoing efforts that keep our town running and moving forward.

Council's Municipal Plan sets the direction for what we want to achieve together, and this report shows how those commitments are being brought to life. Each section connects directly to the objectives endorsed by Council, demonstrating how decisions made by Council are creating real outcomes for residents, businesses, and visitors.

Throughout this reporting period, Council teams have focused on delivering essential services our community relies on – while also advancing major projects that will strengthen Alice Springs for years to come. From infrastructure upgrades and community facilities to environmental initiatives and programs that build liveability, the results reflect a shared commitment to pride, connection, and opportunity.

This report isn't just about statistics - it's about transparency, accountability, and storytelling. It highlights how Council's resources are being used wisely, how performance is measured, and how we continue to adapt to meet community needs. Most importantly, it celebrates the collective effort of our team, partners, and community members who work together to make Alice Springs a great place to live, work and visit.

Council Highlights



Glow Party

Council's recent Glow Party proved a major success, attracting 863 community members. The event showcased strong engagement, with participants enjoying 2,600 neon glow sticks, 300 flashing noodles, and a vibrant 14kg of colour. Families were well catered for, with 875 sausages and 681 slushies served throughout the evening. Activities included games, chalking, bouncing, face painting, and dancing. The turnout and atmosphere highlight the value of Council-led events in fostering connection, community pride, and family-friendly participation.



Red CentreNATS Night Market

Council was proud to partner and organise the Red CentreNATS Night Markets and Fringe Festival event, which brought thousands of locals and visitors into the heart of Alice Springs. The evening featured vibrant stalls, live performances, family activities, and a buzzing festival atmosphere that showcased local creativity and community spirit. By activating the CBD with colour, entertainment, and opportunities for small businesses, the event highlighted the positive economic and social impact of Council-supported initiatives in drawing people together and strengthening community pride.



Seniors Month

Council delivered a series of well-attended activities throughout Seniors Month, celebrating and recognising the contributions of senior residents in our community. Highlights included a High Tea Bingo at the Library, the much-loved Seniors Morning Tea, and the entertaining Seniors Still Got Talent show, which showcased the creativity and spirit of our senior community. These events provided opportunities for connection, fun, and recognition, reinforcing Council's commitment to supporting active, inclusive, and engaged lifestyles for seniors in Alice Springs.



Meeting Rooms Renamed

Council has renamed its meeting rooms in line with the Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan, embedding Arrernte culture into everyday spaces. Each room now carries the name of a culturally significant animal, with QR codes linking to a pronunciation guide developed with Lhere Artepe. The initiative represents respect, understanding and unity, with stories and histories at its heart. Council acknowledges the Working Group's role in achieving the Reflect RAP and has commenced designing an Innovate RAP.



Digital Screen

Council has recently installed a **new digital screen** in the Civic Centre reception, enhancing the way information is shared with the community. This initiative is designed to improve accessibility and engagement by providing residents and visitors with up-to-date details on Council services, programs, events, and key announcements. The digital platform allows for timely updates and clear communication, ensuring important information is easy to find.

Capital Works Updates



Road Reseal Program FY23-26

\$2,173,351.36

Delivering critical maintenance across the municipality's sealed road network, ensuring longevity and safety. FY 24-26 Road Reseal Program 100% completed.

Stormwater Cleaning Program FY24-26

\$964.472.01

Cleaning stormwater drains, pipes, and culverts within the municipality for efficient flow of stormwater and to support flood mitigation. FY 24-26 Stormwater Cleaning Programme 100% completed.

Purchase of New Shredder Regional Waste Management

\$957.770.01

Improving recycling and efficiency at the Regional Waste and Management Facility through the procurement of a shredder to break down bulky materials, which will also extend the landfill's life by increasing compaction density. New Shredder purchased. 70% completed, as currently on delivery phase with a six-week lead time on machinery to be delivered from NSW.

Footpath Program

\$1.800.000.00

Ensuring pedestrian safety by addressing priority footpaths requiring immediate repairs. Tender closed. Currently, reviewing some changes in scope and will go back to Tender again.

Line Marking Program

\$300,000.00

Enhancing safety and efficiency by providing clear visual guidance for pedestrians and vehicles on Council roads.

FY 25-27 Line Marking Programme 10% contract commenced. Currently underway signing contractors and purchase order.

Park Upgrades FY25/26

\$630.000.00

Installing new play equipment, infrastructure, and shade structures at identified parks across the municipality.

The contract for the supply of play equipment has been awarded. Tender documentation for the installation and associated construction works is currently being prepared and is scheduled for release to the market by mid-October.





ASTC Regional Skatepark and Play Precinct Construction

\$8,600,000.00

Providing Alice Springs a regional scale community space, including a skatepark, pump track, adventure play space and more. The construction works for the project have advanced significantly with the project now reaching nearly 70% completion. The majority of structural and infrastructure works are in place. Key achievements include near completion of the pump track, installation of light towers and water services, and significant progress on play equipment, drainage, and half court construction. Current works are focused on skatepark completion, landscaping, and final service connections.



Animal Shelter Administration Office – Staff Protective Screens Installation & Upgrades

\$43.560.00

Enhancing safety and ensuring a userfriendly facility for Animal Shelter staff and visitors. Most of the works have been completed, with only the Occupancy Permit and the commencement of the Defects Liability Period outstanding.

Depot Amenities Upgrade

\$620,000,00

Providing modern, accessible amenities at the Council's Depot Facility. The construction phase of the project is now nearing completion. Final handover documentation is currently being prepared in parallel with the rectification of identified defects. A small number of back-ordered items remain outstanding but are expected to be installed shortly. In preparation for the operational phase, all new furniture for the facility has already been delivered and is currently on site, ready for installation.

Council Plan Updates

Alice Springs Public Art Masterplan

- Council Officers are researching grant opportunities to develop and facilitate a workshop to inform, discuss and facilitate professional development for public art in Alice Springs. The workshops would include a presentation on ethical public art commissioning, ASTC's public art policy and framework, a previously engaged artist from an ASTC project, creative facilitation, discussion and forum with hopeful engagement with NAVA representatives, local and acclaimed public artists.
- Council Officers have been revising the existing Public Art map for online and hard-copy updates. Additional technological features have been rolling out on existing and new commissions with QR code interpretive signage since 2024's Roller Shutter Mural project to link to the ASTC website for more information and imagery, with additional features set to be included in the delivery of new commissions.
- Council Officers amended the online *Artist Register* form to include: "Do you allow Alice Springs Town Council to share your contact details for external opportunities should they arise?". Artists have since been shared with two third-party organisations.
- A range of public art projects under the Masterplan are currently being commissioned, or funding be sought, including for the Geoff Miers Roundabout, Newland Park, and a range of sites in the CBD, including as part of the Regenerating the Alice Town Centre Project. Fabrication of the Eaglehawk Roundabout is at 80%.

Alice Springs Greening Strategy

- As part of Pilot Project 2 of the Greening Strategy, Council has trialled additional planting (infill planting) on Lindsay Ave and the south end of Winnecke Ave to fill gaps between existing larger trees.
- As part of Pilot Project 3 of the Greening Strategy, additional planting (infill planting) has occurred at Kempeana and Diarama parks to support the growth of shade. Gillen Park has also been vastly planted. Collaboration has occurred with the community for Davidson Park.
- Most of the bus stops on Council land have now had trees planted, with the aim of two trees per bus stop. Flynn Drive IGA lawns are also now partially filled.
- As part of the Cool Schools Project, Braitling Primary and Bradshaw Primary have been selected for a tree planting trial to provide additional shade within an initial 200m radius of each school.
- A total of over 400 trees have been planted, with over 500 waiting at Council's tree farm and 500 to be delivered by Olive Pink by the end of 2025. So far, the success rate of planting is very high and vandalism rate is very low.

The market featured Show and Shine cars, local stalls, live music and children's entertainment. Approximately 2,000 event attendees enjoyed the evening with a program highlight being the Bojangles Saloon Motorbike Ride-Through.
Deliver four pop up events	Community Development	The inaugural Glow Fest Pop Up Park was held on 26th September, week one of the School Holidays. Activating the Aquatic and Leisure Centre's Adventure Park this well attended event of 863 people had free-to-the-public glow in the dark face painting, DJ and disco lights, BBQ, slushies, a Disco Dome jumping castle, and mini golf and glow in the dark games. Planning is underway for the Halloween Pop Up Park, to be held in the CBD in late October.

Current works are focused on skatepark and bowl completion, with works also beginning on landscaping, and final service connections.
Consult on the Parks and Playgrounds Implementation Plan		Technical Services	The findings of the Parks and Playgrounds Implementation Plan are scheduled to be presented to the newly elected Council members. A paper will be submitted at the upcoming Ordinary Council Meeting to seek direction. The outcome of this meeting is expected to guide the next steps in the implementation process.

Upgrade three parks	Technical Services	Playground equipment procurement complete. Tender for installation being prepared. Council is progressing upgrades to five parks in alignment with the Alice Springs Parks & Playgrounds Implementation Plan. The parks included in this year's program are Gillen Park (East Side), Forrest Park and Robert Park (Gillen), Dixon Park (Braitling), and Albrecht Oval (Larapinta). Play equipment for all sites has already been ordered. Construction tender documentation is currently being finalised and is scheduled for release to the market by the end of October 2025. Once the tender process is complete, construction will commence across the selected park locations. These upgrades aim to enhance recreational spaces and improve amenities for the local community.
Upgrade shade to three parks	Technical Services	Designs for new shade structures have been completed and will be delivered as part of the Parks Upgrade Program. These structures are designed to enhance user comfort and amenities at selected park sites. The construction and installation works are currently being prepared for market release and will form part of the Parks Upgrade tender scheduled to be advertised by the end of October 2025.
Continue to partner with the Northern Territory Government to install lights at Jim McConville Oval	Technical Services	The Northern Territory Government has completed the initial works, including installation of conduits, pits, scoreboard, and goal posts. Final design plans are currently under review with Council. The NTG has scheduled the commencement of the main construction works to begin next quarter.
Complete one accessibility upgrade to a Council owned facility	Technical Services	A hearing loop facility was successfully installed in the Council reception area last quarter. This upgrade enhances customer service for residents with hearing impairments by transmitting audio directly to compatible hearing aids, improving accessibility and communication. Council Officers are currently identifying other critical areas that require attention and are in the process of drafting scope of works documentation for future accessibility improvements.
Commence construction for the upgrades of Paul Fitzsimons Oval	Technical Services	Tender complete and awaiting lease finalisation. The tender has been released to the market, and evaluation has been completed. The project is now ready for Council approval, pending the Minister's approval and formalisation of the lease agreement between Charles Darwin University and the Council, as required by the grant conditions. Once the lease is signed off, construction of the new club rooms, car parking, and lighting can commence
Undertake plant refurbishment at the Alice Springs Aquatic & Leisure Centre	Technical Services	Tender for pool liner being prepared. Council is currently in the process of engaging a consultant to conduct a cost-effectiveness assessment of refurbishment options for the 25m indoor pool. The focus will be on comparing ease of maintenance against maximising the lifespan of the system. The consultant will assess potential refurbishment methods, provide recommendations, and deliver a report to guide decision-making for the next phases of the project.

Continue to develop and deliver regular term and school holiday programs for children and young people in partnership with local service providers	Community Development	A highlight of the Winter School Holiday program was a giant obstacle course and colour smash at Traeger Park which saw approximately 63 young people attend each day. Other winter school holiday activities included free ten-pin bowling, free mini-golf and barbeques, free rock wall climbing and skate and basketball sessions. Across the 3 weeks of school holidays 4,652 young people engaged with Council's programs. Term 3 after school programs included skate workshops on Wednesdays and art and craft workshops on Fridays at Lyndavale Park.
Continue to encourage strong community use of the Alice Springs Aquatic & Leisure Centre, including investigating and delivering innovative aquatic and landbased wellness and engagement programs for all ages and demographics	Community Development	A total of 29,370 people attended ASALC over the reporting period. This saw an increase of 8,033 people compared to the same period in 2024. This includes over 10,000 people who visited the centre throughout the free entry period of the Spring School Holidays. The ASALC Adventure Park has been very popular throughout this period. ASTC launched its 2025/26 Health and Wellness Program in July 2025. ASALC offered seven weekly aquatic exercise classes between July-September 2025. A new water pilates program was introduced in July which has been popular with the community, focusing on a slower, more controlled form of aquatic exercise.
Increase Alice Springs Public Library outreach activities	Community Development	 This quarter the Alice Springs Public Library (ASPL) actively engaged with the community through a range of outreach programs and partnerships. Key highlights include: Alice Springs Show 04 & 05 July: The library participated in two sessions, reaching 211 attendees. John Strehlow Author Talk: partnering with local author to extend library content beyond regular patrons. School Visits: Visits such as the Steiner School program on 28/07/2025 engaged 21 children visiting the library. Congress Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander stall in Todd Mall on 15/08/2025: Engaged 128 community members, strengthening connections with local Indigenous communities. Books on Wheels & Old Timers Delivery: targeted outreach services for seniors, delivering library resources directly to those unable to visit the library. Partner Programs: collaborating with organisations such as NT Consumer Affairs, Dementia Australia, NT Working Women's Centre, and Tax Help extended library services and information to new audiences (total 116 participants across multiple sessions). Seniors Month High Tea Bingo: the library celebrated Seniors Month with our annual tradition of High Tea Bingo on 23/08/2025, the event welcomed 56 seniors into the library.

Continue to deliver a range of recreational activities and events that encourage a healthy, active community	Community Development	ASTC launched is 2025/26 Health and Wellness Program in July 2025. This program consists of ten weekly exercise classes including yoga, Qi Gong and mums and bubs classes held at ASALC. More than 1000 people have attended these classes in the last three months. Regular fortnightly pram parties held across the community continue to be delivered and are popular with the community.

Support responsible pet ownership, including providing education through the Animal Shelter	Community Development	Both Rangers and the Animal Shelter team continue to offer advice on responsible pet ownership including information on de-sexing, registration, containment and vaccinations. A poster outlining this information is being developed to be displayed in the community and also in Town Camps.
Continue to support animal adoptions through the Animal Shelter	Community Development	With regular opening hours established the Shelter can continue offering adoption services. A successful Adoption Day was held on 30 August which saw 10 animals find their fur-ever homes. A campaign to increase awareness of the ability for interstate adoptions is currently being planned.
Improve access to the CBD by maintaining parking enforcements (fines)	Community Development	Patrols occur regularly, with 536 infringements issued this quarter across Alice Springs with a focus on the CBD.
Improve visual amenity by maintaining trolley enforcement (collections and fines)	Community Development	Rangers are actively engaging trolley stakeholders and therefore limited trolley collection was required this quarter.

Council is also trying to cater to a slightly older demographic by scheduling some of the free cinema sessions during the early evening, online gaming etc. Rangers will operate/have an on-call presence seven days per week over summer, with a particular focus on illegal camping and abandoned vehicles (on ASTC operated roads).
